Thank you all for giving me the pleasure and challenge of being the Technical Director this year. I am not suggesting everyone modify their cars or follow everything I may put in these articles, but I find them interesting.

The following article was taken from the Ft. Worth Model A Ford Club on-line.

Horn Rewiring: Model A Sparton Horn

I'm interested in rewiring a Model A Sparton Horn from 6 volts to 12 volts. Could you please provide guidance on the wire size and the number of turns required for this conversion?

To convert a Model A Sparton Horn from 6 volts to 12 volts, you'll need to rewire the two field coils while leaving the armature as it is. Here's how to do it:

- 1. Disassemble the horn to remove the brushes and the armature.
- 2. Unsolder the two wires at the connector clip (one from each field coil).
- 3. Pay attention to the direction of winding on the coils; they are wound in opposite directions.

The general rule for doubling the voltage is to use half the wire size and double the number of turns. In this case, going from 6 volts to 12 volts, you should use 24-gauge wire. While the original wire is 20-gauge, it's challenging to find 23-gauge wire (which would be half the size), so 24-gauge wire, readily available at places like Radio Shack, is a suitable choice.

The 6-volt coils typically have 45 turns each. To convert to 12 volts, you can wind each coil with around 100 turns of 24-gauge wire. It's essential to use coated wire, usually used for winding RF radio coils or speaker coils. After winding the horn coils, consider applying a light varnish coat to help with insulation.

When winding the coils, they don't need to be wound tightly or in perfectly neat rows. Some original horns had precise and straight windings, while others were wound more haphazardly. Experimenting with slightly looser windings and a less structured approach may yield better results in horn operation.

MAFFI Trustees Jerry Dennany and Randy Czubko worked with a crew from the Grape A's Model A Club in Kalamazoo, MI. Vehicles, vignettes, and all memorabilia had to be carefully moved and covered (construction dust) because the back wall of the museum was opened up to connect the expansion to the current museum. MODEL A ERA 1928-1931 Submitted by Kris Francis



Although we think of Valentine's Day as the day of Love, in 1929 it marks the most infamous gangster mass murder in history, when mobsters Al Capone, "Bugs" Moran, and others fought for their share of the profits from illegal activity in Chicago.

The St. Valentine's Day Massacre shocked the world on February 14, 1929, when Chicago's North Side erupted in gang violence. Gang warfare ruled the streets of

Chicago during the late 1920s, as chief gangster Al Capone sought to consolidate control by eliminating his rivals in the illegal trades of bootlegging, gambling and prostitution.

This rash of gang violence reached its bloody climax in a garage on the city's North Side on February 14, 1929, when seven men associated with the Irish gangster George "Bugs" Moran, one of Capone's longtime enemies, were shot to death by several men dressed as policemen. The St. Valentine's Day Massacre, as it was known, remains an unsolved crime and was never officially linked to Capone, but he was generally considered to have been responsible for the murders.

From 1924 to 1930, the city of Chicago gained a widespread reputation for lawlessness and violence. Not coincidentally, this phenomenon coincided with the reign of chief crime lord Al "Scarface" Capone, who took over from his boss Johnny Torrio in 1925. (Torrio, who was seriously wounded in an assassination attempt in 1924, had "retired" to Brooklyn.) Prohibition, ushered in by the passage of the 18th Amendment in 1920, had greatly increased the earnings of America's gangsters through



bootlegging (the illegal manufacture and sale of alcohol) and speakeasies (illicit drinking establishments), as well as gambling and prostitution. Capone's income from these activities was estimated at some \$60 million a year; his net worth in 1927 was around \$100 million. Over the years, Al Capone consolidated control over most of Chicago's crime rackets by ruthlessly gunning down his rivals. In 1924, authorities counted some 16 gang-related murders; this brand of slaying continued until 1929, reaching a high of 64 murders in one year during that time. Federal authorities, including the Federal Bureau of Investigation, had much less jurisdiction than they have today, and did not include Chicago's gang-related activity.

Chicago's gang war reached its bloody climax in the socalled St. Valentine's Day Massacre of 1929. One of Capone's longtime enemies, the Irish gangster George "Bugs" Moran, ran his bootlegging operations out of a garage at 2122 North Clark Street. On February 14, seven members of Moran's operation were gunned down while standing lined up,

facing the wall of the garage. Some 70 rounds of ammunition were fired. When police officers from Chicago's 36th District

arrived, they found one gang member, Frank Gusenberg, barely alive. In the few minutes before he died, they pressed him to reveal what had happened, but Gusenberg wouldn't talk.

Police could find only a few eyewitnesses, but eventually concluded that gunmen dressed as police officers had entered the garage and pretended to be arresting the men. Though Moran and others immediately blamed the massacre on Capone's gang, the famous gangster himself claimed to have been at his home in Florida at the time. No one was ever brought to trial for the murders. It remains one of the biggest unsolved crimes in history.

A Home Town Visit by Carolyn Kaiser

As we celebrated our hometowns at the January 18th Luncheon, Carolyn Kaiser brought me a handwritten story of her family's hometown of Denmark, Kansas (about 10 miles NW of Lincoln.) Founded in 1869 by Danish settlers, the city of Denmark has a rich history and a fascinating story of perseverance and togetherness. Read on as Carolyn tells the history of her maternal grandfather, Peter Bertelson, and Denmark, Kansas.



"Peter left home in Denmark in the night, got to London and shipped to the United States. He knew about Denmark, Kansas and settled there. It wasn't long before he met my Swedish grandmother, Emma Nelson. They married when he was 40 and she as 18 in the church with a white steeple. Peter and Emma had several children there. Two died and were buried next to the church. Emma was born in a cave or crevice in the Spillman Creek during the last Indian raid through Denmark in 1889. I heard a few stories about them through my mother, Lena Hekanson and her brother Olaf of twenty years older.

"In about 2000, Larry & I traveled to Sterling, Kansas to see 2 of our grandchildren at Sterling College. I had just learned that we were close to Denmark, so we went to find it, but it wasn't easy. The same well-groomed church and hall were there but that's all. After snooping around miles of fields we found a sign that said "Nielson", so we drove down a long dirt and gravel driveway and were welcomed by a pack of dogs. After 20 minutes of hearing my story, Merrill believed these California people. I told him about my grandmother Emma being born here and her mother died when she was 8. Her father let her and her brother roam and were later adopted by a neighbor by the name of Nygaard. To make a long story short, Merrill Nielson is the grandson of the Nygaards. He said the little white frame house, which is down a long continued driveway, is where she lived and he uses it for a hunting lodge. He said in May (6 months later) was the 150th anniversary of the town hall. He invited us to come and stay in the Nygaard's. So my cousin, her son, Larry & I did just that! Amazing! Had much pleasure with what God plans for us!"

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
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
