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Highlights of the March Tech Seminar

The Bendix drive assembly engages the starter motor with the flywheel ring gear. There is a spring that is a part of the Bendix assembly, that absorbs the initial shock when the Bendix drive engages with the flywheel ring gear. The high RPM of the starter motor throws the Bendix gear into the flywheel ring gear, thereby starting the engine. Upon release of the starter switch, the starter motor stops, allowing the high RPM of the rotating ring gear to spin the Bendix back out of the way of the ring gear. *IF the starter motor does not engage with the flywheel, the problem is often with the Bendix drive assembly.* Three faults commonly cause this: 1) Broken Bendix spring, 2) Broken starter drive sleeve, or 3) Bendix spring bolts broken, or vibrated loose.

This seminar was a continuation from a distress call from Rand Pugmire for a problem with his 30 Coupe not starting. The A team was called, to try and figure out why it wouldn't start! The battery was fully charged, but the starter would not engage, or even turn the engine over. Perplexing, to say the least!!

Don Ratzlaff suggested we put the transmission in high gear and rock the car, to see if the Bendix was stuck. Sure enough, the Bendix snapped back with a loud "POP", and the engine was able to start once again. Replacing the old Bendix with a donated new one was MORE than enough reason for yet another donut and coffee session at Richard Parrish's house a few days later.

Pulling the starter (thanks Nathan Sherry), the Bendix assembly showed some signs of wear on the teeth. A bit closer inspection of the flywheel revealed some metal shavings in the housing area. Using an inspection mirror we found some more wear on the flywheel teeth. But, for a more thorough inspection, we would have to remove the engine, or drive train. Installing the Bendix on the starter, and replacing the starter back in the car, will hopefully help prevent any future problems (FYI, I had never done it before, so it was a learning process for me also). Apparently, the Bendix sticking is a common problem that might occur again in the future, but hopefully not.

FYI, there are also more modern geared starters on the market that sell for around \$250.00-\$300.00, but those require removing and reversing the ring gear on the flywheel. There is also a modern style Bendix available for \$30.00-\$50.00 that directly replaces the original style Bendix gear (suggested for 12V cars) (no need to reverse the ring gear).

Thanks to all who pitched in to help in this learning process. Thanks to Richard Parrish for the use of his home for this project. And thank you Bruce MacIntosh for the donation of the new Bendix assembly.

ACCC Update: SB 712, aka, Leno's Law

Recent legislative activity saw the introduction of California Senate Bill 712, affectionately known as Leno's Law. This bill could make life much easier for the thousands of classic car enthusiasts in California by amending the state's stringent smog rules, which currently mandate smog checks for vehicles built in or after 1976. If passed into law, <u>California Senate Bill 712</u> would "fully exempt" any vehicle that was made at least 35 years ago, if it were insured as a collector vehicle. Senator Shannon Grove, a Republican representing Bakersfield, is the bill's sponsor.

Jay Leno, known as a famous car collector as well as a comedian, is obviously in support of the bill and has agreed to promote the bill. "California's rich classic car culture, sparked by the post-war hot rod boom and boosted by Hollywood's love for chrome and horsepower, has made it a paradise for enthusiasts like me," said Leno to <u>NBC Los Angeles</u>. "California's smog check laws for classic cars need to be updated—they vary too much from state to state, and California's rules don't match up with neighboring ones."

While this doesn't impact our Model A's, those who own other collector cars will certainly feel relief if this bill becomes law. Emissions testing on pre-OBD2 vehicles (i.e. 1995 and older) is getting more difficult each year, as the number of vehicles being tested continues to decline and shops cannot justify maintaining the tools and experience needed to conduct an inspection.

BLT Install 3-10-25

Another banner day for the BLT Guys. The task was to install a Mitchell overdrive, sync transmission, clutch and flywheel in a 1931 Victoria owned by David Griffiths of Yuma, AZ. The owner made a <u>\$1200 donation to the Model A</u> Ford Youth Restoration Program. The installation took place at my house in Westminster.

The owner had the overdrive and transmission shipped direct to my house, and I provided a rebuilt bell housing, so we were able to have the transmission and bell housing bolted together beforehand. The owner brought the clutch and flywheel out with him.

The plan was for the owner to trailer the car out from Yuma on Monday March 10, leaving early in the morning. Several BLT Guys would be on hand when he arrived in the afternoon and we would start working on the car. Arrival time was IPM and four of us began working on the car hoping to get everything out of the car that day and finish the project on Tuesday. Later Monday afternoon three more BLT Guys showed up.

By 7PM Monday evening with seven of us working on the car the project was complete and the owner was able to head back to Yuma early the next morning.

There were no show stoppers, everything went well and performed as Henry Ford and Steve Mitchell ordered.

Recognition is hereby given to the individuals of an exceptional BLT crew that installed a Mitchell overdrive, sync transmission, V-8 clutch, machined flywheel, and rebuild bell housing, all in six hours from when the car arrived at the work place. Four BLT members were on hand at I PM when the car arrived from Yuma, AZ on a trailer. Three more BLT members showed up a short time later. By 7 PM the job was completed. The installation raised \$1200. for the Model A Youth Restoration Program.

The following are a few excerpts of firsthand accounts from folks that were there at the inception of the **Famous Route 66**

In the heart of Oklahoma City, Grady Bell recalled how his father had worked on Route 66 all the way across Oklahoma. It saved them from starving during the Depression when Dad got a job with the Works Progress Administration (WPA). He hauled dirt with a team of horses and a dirt shovel from 1930 to 1938. Likewise, LeRoy Martin helped build the road around Elk City

when he was 15 years old. Life was tough but they were happy to have work. Allie Alba, who had come to Oklahoma in a covered wagon, recalled watching the concrete being laid. "...the concrete would expand in hot weather, and cold weather it would draw up. It had to have space. I worked out there on the highway when they done it. We had to take it out if we didn't leave space because it'd buckle up."


Garland Lowry had his own memories in Canute; "We had a street dance under the railroad trestle when they finished the pavement, the night before they opened it up to traffic. It took plum two or three years to get that road paved through town."

The last part of U.S. 66 to be paved in Oklahoma was a short section from Miami to Afton, which was completed in autumn of 1937. At last! But what about the other Southwestern states? Stay tuned...
